1923 to 1942

- This talk will focus only on selected usages of the 5-hole OHMS perforated officials
- It will illustrate mostly postal history with some selected stamps
- Includes better items including:
 - Registered covers to England
 - Unique Bluenose block of six
 - Postal Stationery
 - Earliest and latest uses
 - Large multiples up to 30
 - Mint Examples




- May 23, 1923 Post Office gave approval to Department of Finance
- Approval was for a pattern with the letters "OHMS" in 2 lines
- Abbreviation for "On His Majesty's Service"
- Legs of the H and M have 5 holes, hence the name "5-Hole OHMS"



- Government minutes show an order for a perforator
 - B.F. Cummins Model #52
 - Single-lever 5-Die perforator
 - Not a 10-Die machine that Roy Wrigley indicates in his writing
 - Machine was replaced in July 1939 with the 4-hole OHMS.





- Stamps perforated in Ottawa for use on foreign mail
- Distributed to 9 Provincial Assistant Receiver Generals
- BNAPS Perfin catalogue records this pattern as O8
- 2nd DIE pattern has missing pin in lower curve of "S"
 - Broken "S" variety is in 20% of small stamps and 1/3 of large stamps


Latest Date - August 5, 1942

Ottawa, Canada cancel on piece with a pair of 4-hole OHMS 3c Royal Visit




Earliest Cover




Ottawa, ON - April 15, 1924

Ottawa, ON – October 22, 1924

- Most mail sent out by the Department of Finance was to or from the Assistant Receiver General provincial branches and to banks
- Therefore, not many stamps were retained except by bank employees and civil servants that were stamp collectors.



- Even scarcer are mint 5-Hole OHMS stamps as most do not exist
- Some old pricelists from the 1940's do list some 2c, 3c and 10c issues
- The first 8 items are the right stamp from the only known mint pairs (now broken into 2 sets of 8) from the March 1989 Sissons Auction.




- DoF received approval to perforate stamps in 1923 and the current issues were the Admiral second colours and the start of Dry Printing
- Means 1c Green, 2c Carmine, 5c Blue, 7c Bistre, 10c Plum not current
- In theory they were available for perforating but I have not seen a legitimate 2c Carmine, 5c Blue or 10c Plum and I believe that most of these values are fake 5-hole OHMS perfins
- The 1c Green and 7c Bistre are scarce but available





- All Admirals exist in Position A and C
- Many are in Position B and D
 - Created when sheet is folded along vertical axis before perforating
- Scarce items are the sideways positions of E and F
 - Created when sheet is inserted sideways before perforating
- Even scarcer items are the G and H positions
 - Created when sheet is gum up and sideways before perforating



- When the perforator lever is pressed twice (or more times) before sliding to the next row of stamps the result is a Double Perfin noted by adding an (X) after the position or for triple strikes adding an (XX)
- Perf/Imperf Pairs with one stamp not having the perfin. Add a (Z).







3¢ Letter Rate from Montreal to Quebec City




June 8, 1925




50¢ BLUENOSE – UNIQUE BLOCK OF SIX











2¢ Deep Red (Die 1) Leaf & Arch Issue







1¢ (Die I) and 2¢ (Die II) Leaf & Arch Issue








13¢ Registration Rate Cover to England – October 10, 1933








Largest Complete Die Setting 5-Hole OHMS Multiple
